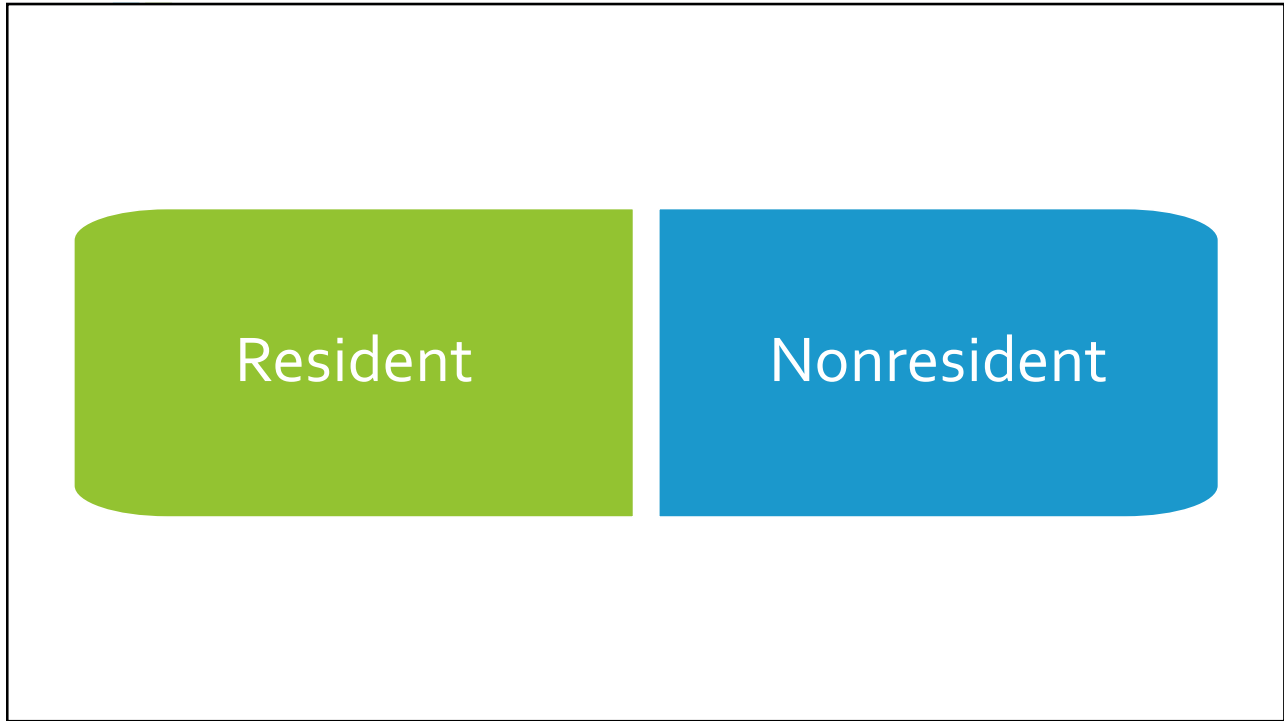

Verification of Identity and Age	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Birth certificate• Baptismal certificate (indicating date and place of birth)• Court records• Governmental records (county, military, passport, immigration)• Doctor or hospital records with a sworn statement• Family records (e.g., Bible)• Life insurance policy
Pupil Residency	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• rent receipt• utility bill• property tax bill• voter registration card• driver's license• reasonable verification

Traditional Resident Pupil

Pupil is eligible to enroll and count as a resident in the district in which either of the parent/legal guardians reside.

Suitable Home Pupil

The pupil lives with a **relative** for the purpose of securing a suitable home and not solely for educational purposes




Power of Attorney

The residence of a person holding a power of attorney over a child does not, by itself, establish residency of the child. Under Section 1148(1) of the Revised School Code, MCL 380.1148(1), a child placed with a person other than a **relative** of the child under a power of attorney does not become a resident of the district.



Resident Student

a **relative** is defined as a parent, grandparent, brother, sister, stepparent, step-grandparent, stepsister, stepbrother, uncle, aunt, first cousin, great aunt, or great uncle by marriage, blood, or adoption

Emancipated Minor

The pupil is 18 years of age or an emancipated minor and resides in the district.



Resident Student

Licensed Home Pupil

The pupil resides in a licensed home, in which he or she was placed by court order or by a child placing agency.

Foreign Exchange Student

The pupil has been issued a visa and resides in the district, or the pupil has been issued a J-1 visa and resides in the district with a host family, or the pupil resides within the district but is undocumented.

Pupil Experiencing Homelessness

The pupil is a child **experiencing homelessness** (as defined in the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, 42 USC 11301 et seq) or is unaccompanied.

Incarcerated Pupil


A pupil who has been incarcerated in a county jail becomes a resident of the district where the county jail is located.

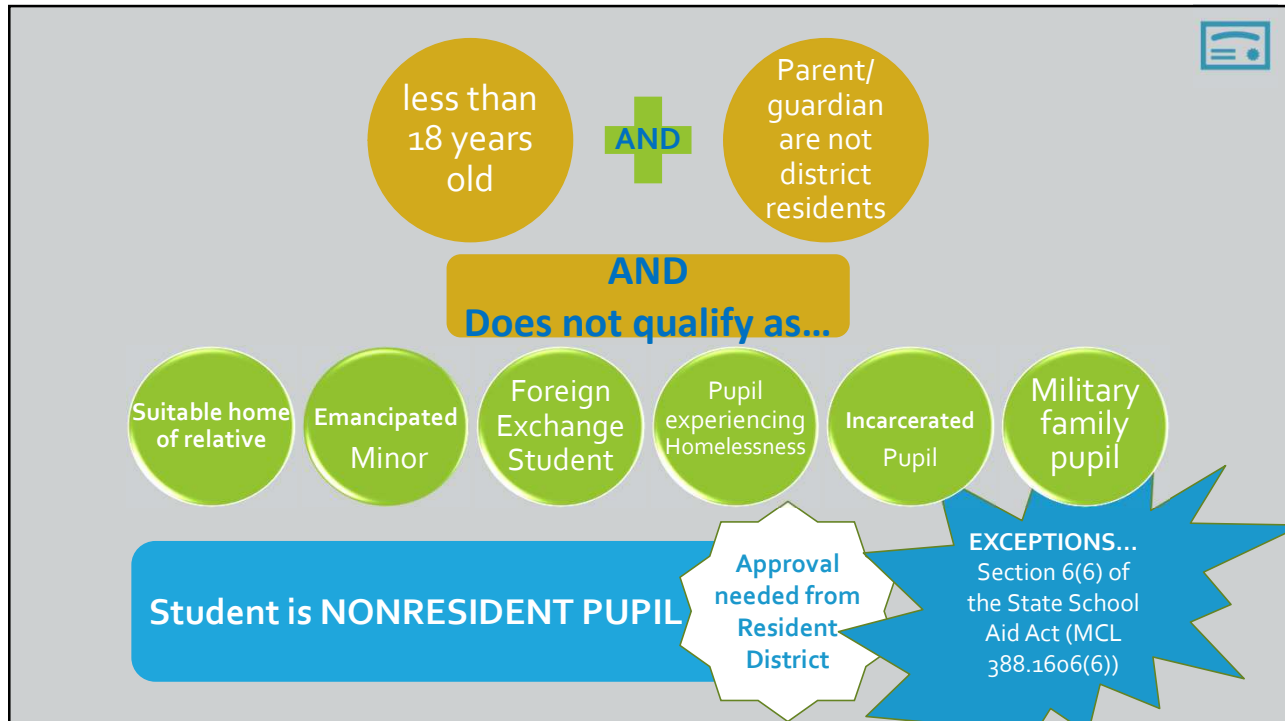

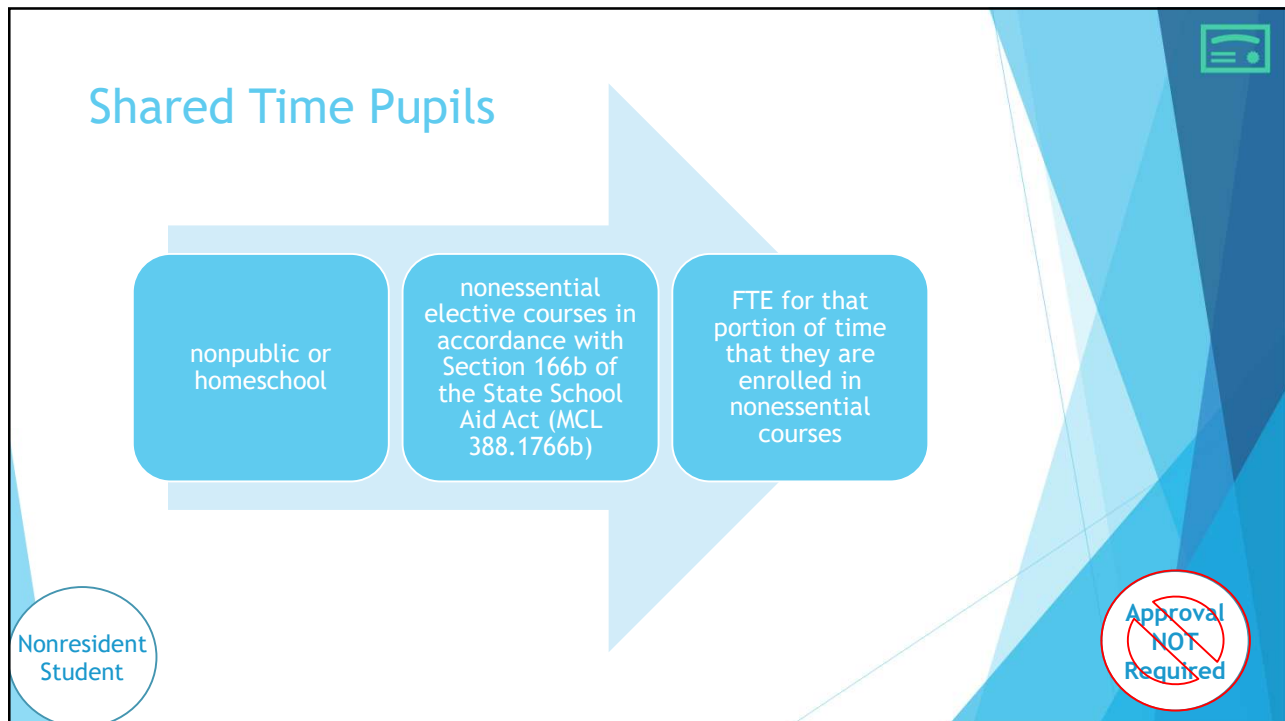

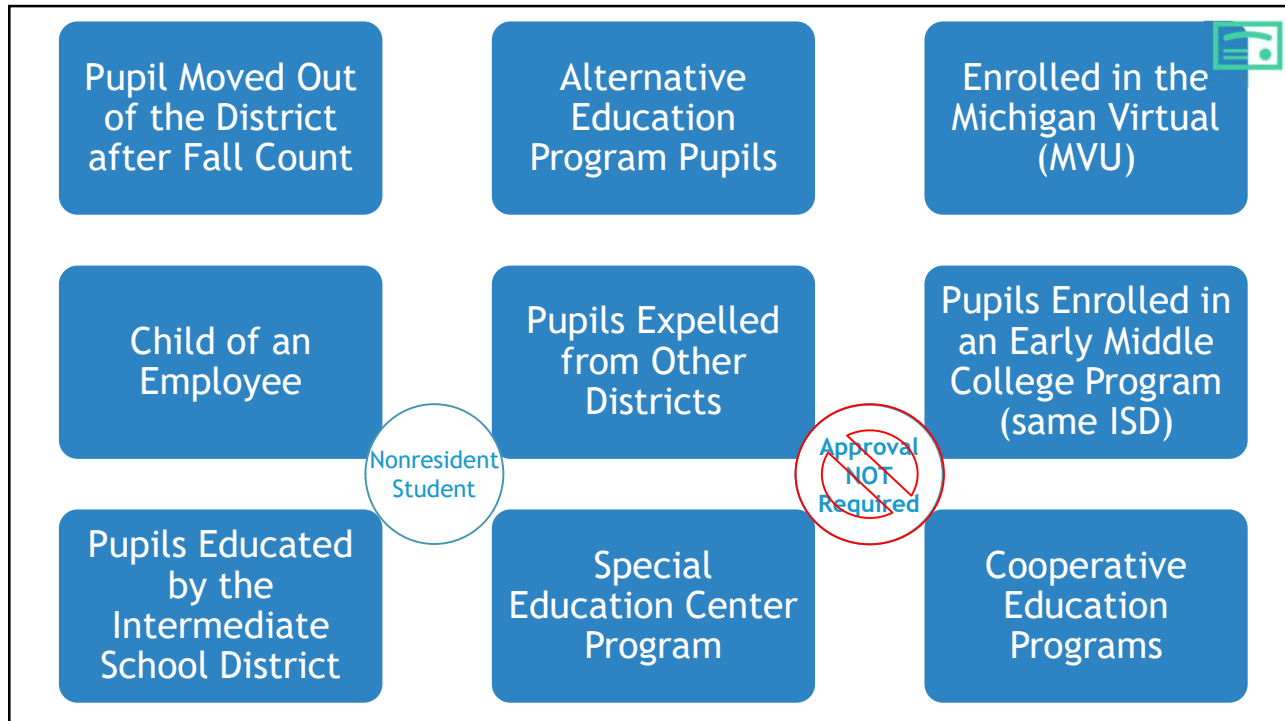

Child of an Employee

A pupil who is the child of a person who works at the district or who is the child of a person who worked at the district as of the time the pupil first enrolled in the district but who no longer works at the district due to a workforce reduction may be counted. "Child" includes an adopted child, stepchild, or legal ward.

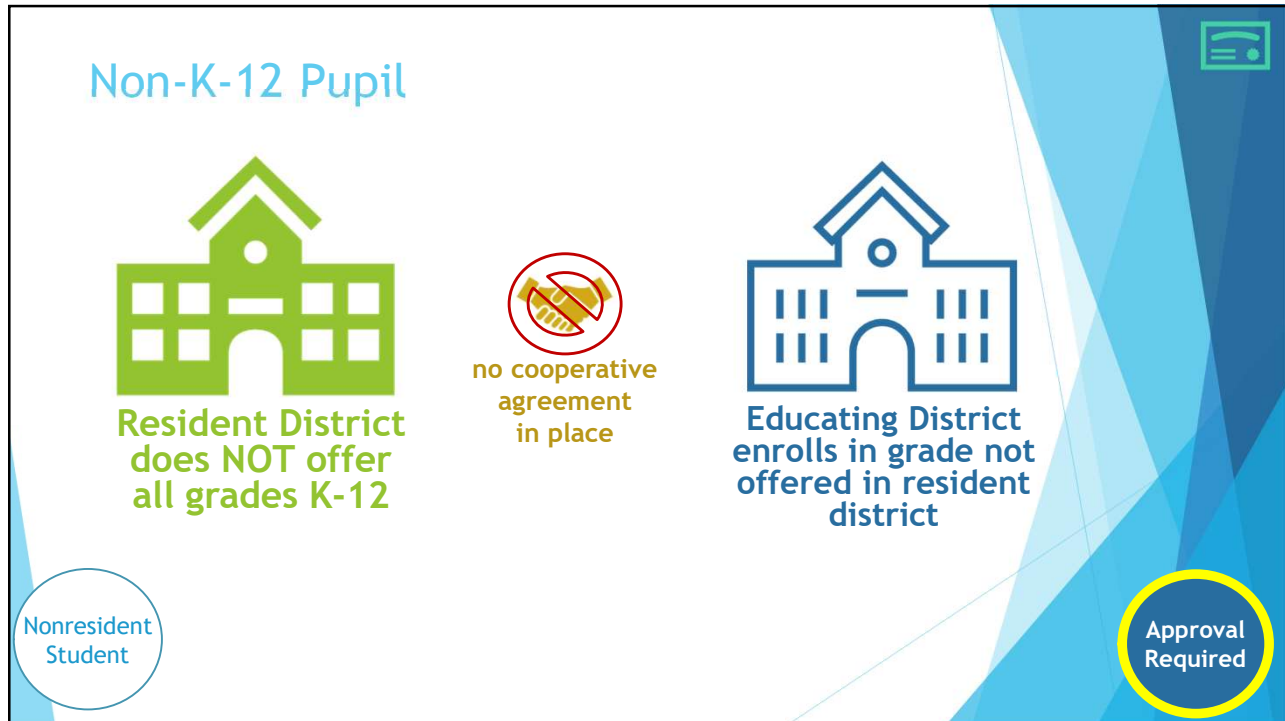
Note: Workforce reduction (which may also be described as downsizing, reduction in force, reorganization, or restructuring) may include a temporary or permanent termination of employment, a reduction in work hours, or a similar employment action.

Employee, as used in this subsection, means a person who has been directly hired by a district who is eligible for benefits in accordance with district employment policies or agreements.
