ORDER

Ours is a nation "deeply committed to safeguarding academic freedom, which is of transcendent value to all of us and not merely to the teachers concerned."

[Keyishian v. Bd. of Regents of Univ. of State of N.Y.](#), 385 U.S. 589, 603 (1967).

Indeed, "[t]he Nation's future depends upon leaders trained through wide exposure to [a] robust exchange of ideas which discovers truth out of a multitude of tongues, [rather] than through any kind of authoritative selection." [Tinker v. Des Moines Indep. Cmty. Sch. Dist.](#), 393 U.S. 503, 512 (1969) (quotation omitted). And "[t]he right to speak freely and to promote diversity of ideas and programs is . . . one of the chief distinctions that sets us apart from totalitarian regimes." [Terminiello v. City of Chicago](#), 337 U.S. 1, 4 (1949). In this case, the court reviews action by the executive branch that threatens to erode these foundational principles.

Three organizations—the National Education Association, its New Hampshire affiliate, and the Center for Black Educator Development—bring this action against the United States Department of Education ("the Department"), Secretary for Education Linda M. McMahon, and Acting Assistant Secretary for

Appropriate Placement

- **Beginning in 2024-25**
- **Loss of FTE for students being taught by inappropriately placed teachers.**
- **Appropriately placed = endorsed (or permitted) in BOTH grade & subject**
- **Double check with your pupil accounting auditor:**
 - **Virtual courses**
 - **Credit recovery courses**
 - **Integrated science & social studies courses**

Sexual Assault Info

- **SB 66 (PA 57 of 2023)**
- **Dist must disseminate to all students in grades 6-12:**
 - **[MDE Sexual Harassment & Sexual Assault Information Guide](#)**
 - **Dist Title IX coordinator contact info (name, email, phone, address)**
 - **Dist policies on sexual assault, sexual harassment**
- **Info must be accessible to students & parents/guardians, be included in student handbooks & similar publications, and be available on the dist website**
- **PD on sexual assault & sexual harassment response encouraged (but not required) at least every five years for all educators and school personnel who have contact with students.**
- **See [MDE Memo #2024 - 052 Sexual Harassment and Sexual Assault Information for Students](#) for more info.**

Effective: 2 Apr 2025

Indigenous Regalia

- **HB 4854 (PA 209 of 2024)**
- **Require districts to allow Native American students to:**
 - Wear traditional regalia
 - Carry traditional objects
- **Applies at ceremonies of honor (e.g. commencement, athletic awards, etc.)**
- **No exception for dress code or other restrictions, but limited scope**
- **Tobacco, weapons prohibited**



Effective: SY 2025-26

Cardiac Emergency

- **PA 36-37 of 2024 (HB 5527-28)**
- **Expands MI's existing cardiac emergency response law**
- **Requires additional...**
 - **Training for cardiac response team members**
 - **AEDs in your building (reachable AED w/in 3 min)**
 - **Cardiac response drills (just the members of the cardiac response team)**



Safe Storage Notification

- **HB 5450-51 (PA 257-58 of 2024)**
 - **MDHHS must develop info & materials for parents on safe storage laws**
 - **Schools must share info with parents annually**
 - **Can be included in beginning of year communications, can be electronic, etc.**

Firearm Storage Requirements and Penalties

Updated February 2024

What are the firearm storage requirements under Michigan's safe storage law? ¹	Definitions
<p>If you store or leave a firearm unattended on premises under your control, and you know or reasonably should know that a minor is, or is likely to be, present on the premises, you are required to do one or more of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Store the firearm in a locked box or container.• Keep the firearm unloaded and lock the firearm with a locking device that is properly engaged to render the firearm inoperable by any individual other than the owner or an authorized user. <p>If you enter onto the premises of another individual and you store or leave a firearm unattended on those premises, and you know or reasonably should know that a minor is, or is likely to be, present on the premises, you are required to do one or more of the following:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1 Store the firearm in a locked box or container.2 Keep the firearm unloaded and lock the firearm with a locking device that is properly engaged to render the firearm inoperable by any individual other than the owner or an authorized user.3 Before entering the premises, do both of the following:<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Store the firearm in a locked box or container in your motor vehicle, or keep the firearm unloaded and lock the firearm with a locking device that is properly engaged to render the firearm inoperable by any individual other than the owner or an authorized user, and• Lock your motor vehicle.	<p>"Locked box or container"</p> <p>Means a secure container, specifically designed for the storage of firearms, that is fully enclosed and locked by a padlock, key lock, combination lock, or similar locking device to which a minor does not possess the key or combination, or otherwise have access.</p> <p>"Locking device"</p> <p>Means a trigger lock, cable lock, or similar lock that prevents a firearm from discharging.</p> <p>"Minor"</p> <p>Means an individual less than 18 years of age.</p> <p>"Serious impairment of a body function"</p> <p>Means that term as defined in section 58c of the Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.58c.</p>

 - **Creates a single state school safety commission**

 - **BTAM teams in every bldg, clarifies jurisdiction, includes law enforcement, provides training**

- **CREC: revenue up in 23-24, 24-25 & 25-26.**
- **The Balances:**
 - **Balance = projected revenue - current expenses**
 - **SAF: \$2B balance (\$1B ongoing, \$1B one-time)**
 - **GF: \$1B balance (\$450M ongoing, \$550 one-time)**



Risks and Concluding Thoughts

- Largely a “soft landing” outlook for the Michigan economy
 - Moderate employment growth, rising real incomes, and growing tax revenues
- But many risks, including:
 - Changes to the state minimum wage and sick leave policies
 - Trade and tariff policy
 - The path of vehicle electrification
 - ... in addition to national economic risks

MICHIGAN TAX REVENUE FORECAST RISKS

- Federal Policy Changes: Trade, Tariffs, and Tax Reforms may impact the forecast
 - Trade and Tariffs: Present uncertainty to the Michigan outlook
 - Tax Reforms: Many provisions in the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act sunset beginning in 2026
 - Some provisions that impact the Michigan tax base may lapse
- Potential changes to the revenue accrual process and standards
- Transformational Brownfield
 - Incentives awarded or in process of \$1.8 billion currently
 - Nearly all impacts are outside the forecast horizon

Lansing — Gov. Gretchen Whitmer said Wednesday it's not appropriate for kindergarten classes to have 30 students in them after a [Detroit News investigation](#) documented class sizes across Michigan that conflicted with limits set in other states and with what education experts said is best for promoting learning.

Using Michigan's Freedom of Information Act, The News found 206 elementary classes — ranging from kindergarten through fifth grade — across 49 schools over the 2023-24 and 2024-25 years that had at least 30 students in them. Among them was a kindergarten class at Bennett Elementary, where the Detroit Public Schools Community District said 30 students were enrolled.

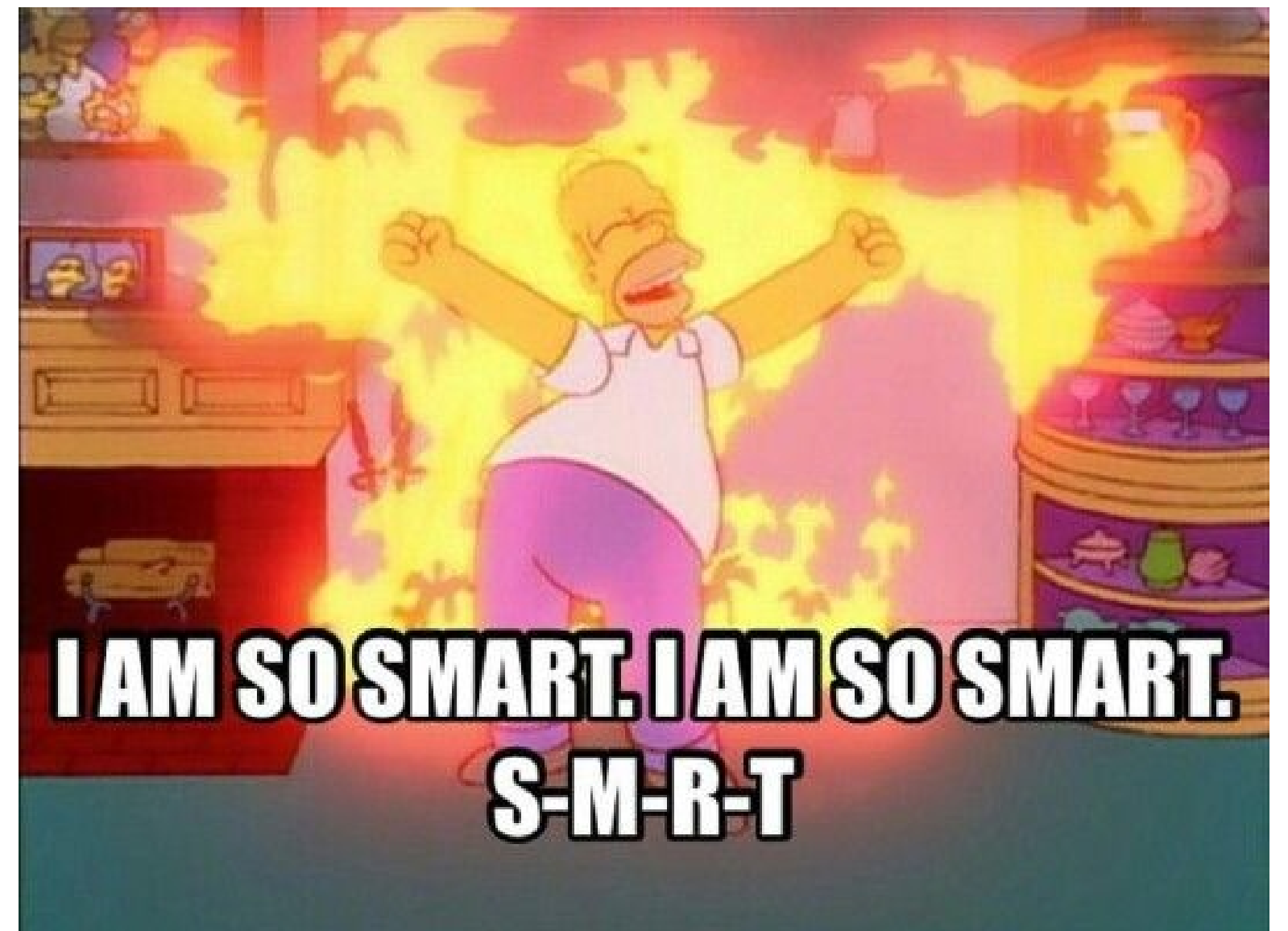

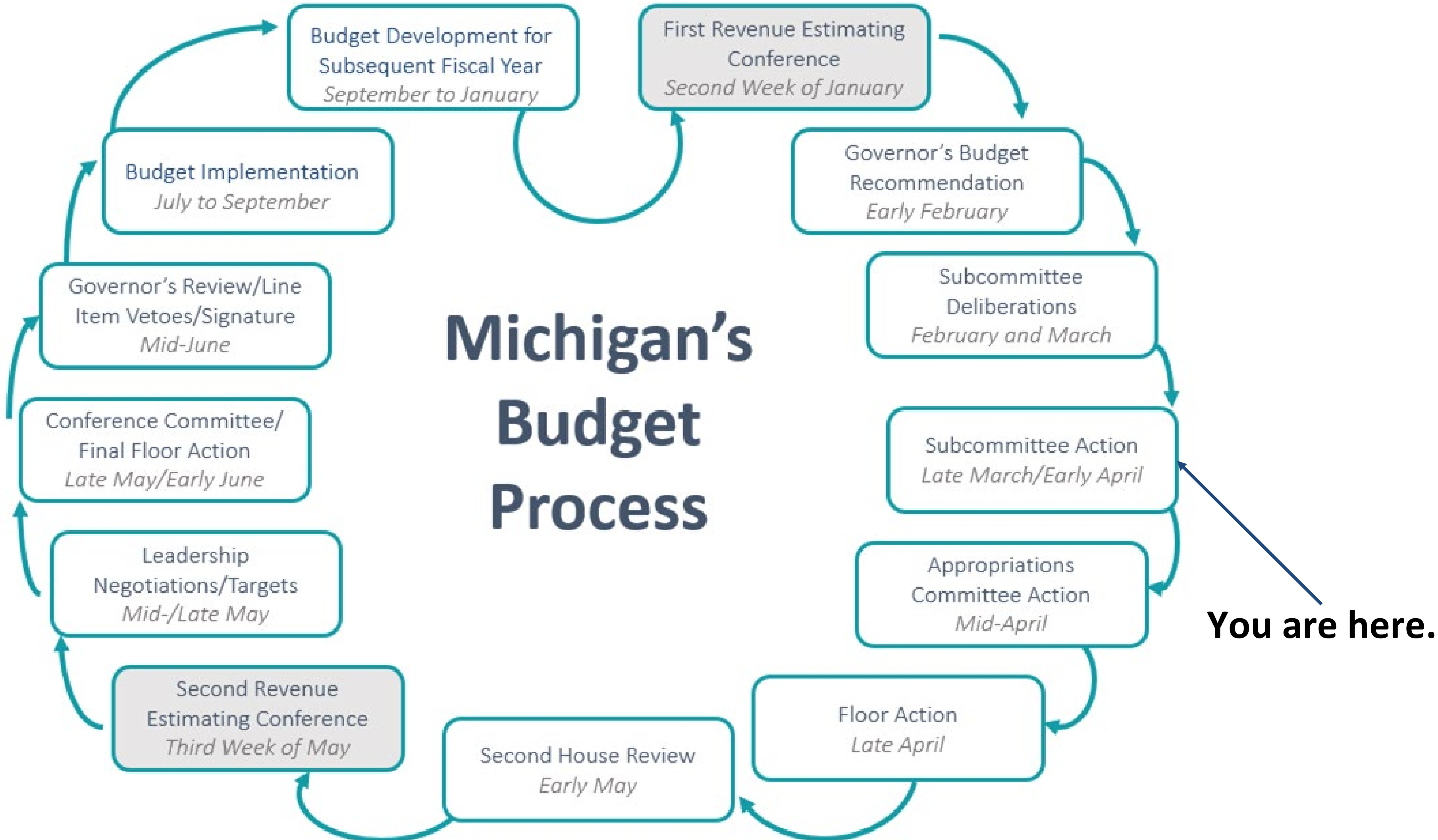

House GOP Ed Plan

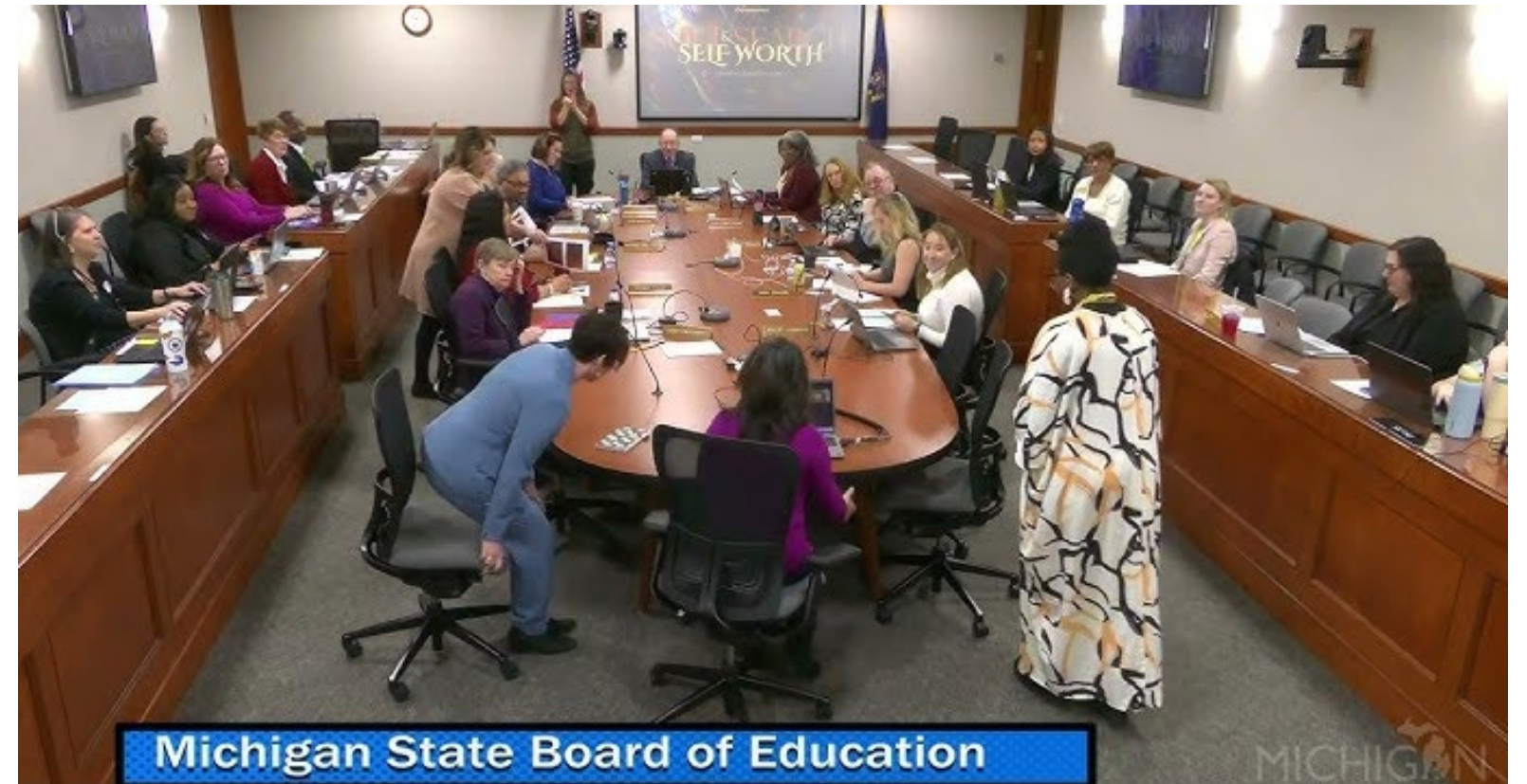
- **HJR E (Schuette)** allows the governor to appoint the state superintendent
- **HB 4147 (Steele)** allows the consolidation of services by including administrative and service functions.
- **HB 4148 (Cavitt)** establishes districts for electing members to the State Board of Education.
- **HB 4149 (Kuhn)** requires schools to utilize the data from the MI School Data Website to provide parents and legal guardians with an annual summary of their school's data.
- **HB 4150 (Tisdell)** waives fees for initial teacher license applications and renewals.
- **HB 4151 (Martin)** allows additional endorsements for a subject area to be issued to an individual who passed the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification for that subject area.
- **HB 4152 (Schmaltz)** revokes math and science program approvals unless the curriculum was developed with a professor who specializes in the subject area beginning September 30, 2027
- **HB 4153 (DeBoer)** allows school districts to issue local teaching certificates.

House GOP Ed Plan

- **HB 4154 (BeGole)** includes trade schools as an option for dual enrollment.
- **HB 4155 (St. Germaine)** requires the Michigan Department of Education to publish a list of recommended curriculum and assessment companies for schools.
- **HB 4156 Alternative Merit Curriculum (Greene)** adds computer science to math and expands on future skills making it so that floating 1/2 credit would need to be a course in career development.
- **HB 4157 and HB 4158 M-STEP Pilot Program (Greene/Thompson)** creates a pilot program for school testing, specifically short interim tests during the school year instead of one long test at the end of the school year.
- **HB 4159 Core Academic Curriculum Requirements (Linting)** adds stricter definitions for science of reading and other requirements under English Language Arts; strengthen the math curriculum by requiring problem-based and feedback response learning and establish a curriculum for kids who exhibit math deficiencies or characteristics of dyscalculia.

Ed Governance

- **HJR E (Schuette)**
 - Makes the position of state superintendent subject to gubernatorial appointment
- **HB 4148 (Cavitt)**
 - Establishes 4 geographic districts for electing members to the State Board of Education.
 - Designates two districts per election on a rotating basis.
 - Requires that parties nominate one member from each district each election.



Teacher Cert

- **HB 4150 (Tisdell)**
 - Waive teacher cert fees for initial certs and renewals.
 - \$8M loss to MDE budget
- **HB 4151 (Martin)**
 - Allow existing teachers to add a subject area endorsement if they:
 - Pass the appropriate MTTC
 - Pay the appropriate fee

Teacher Cert

- **HB 4153 (DeBoer)**

- **Waives the mentor req. for these Ts**
- **Not allowed for special ed**
- **Good for up to 5 yrs (except for CTE, no limit on CTE).**
- **Sunset the issuance of new local certificates after July 1, 2035.**



M-STEP Pilot

- **HB 4157-58 (Greene/Thompson)**
- **Creates a pilot program for an alternative assessment system to M-STEP summative**
- **Two options:**
 - 3X/year interims
 - 2X/year interims & shortened summative
- **90 district limit**
- **Test must align w/ state standards, be able to produce accountability data and pass muster under ESSA**



MMC...Again

- **HB 4156 MMC Revision (Greene)**
- **Increases MMC grad requirements by 2 full credits from 18 to 20**
 - Additional science (+1 cr.)
 - "Future skills" (+1 cr.)
- **Enumerate extensive lists of course titles for fulfilling MMC requirements.**
- **Eliminate option to substitute personal finance for other courses**
- **More CTE course substitutions:**
 - Up to 2 cr each of math, science
 - Up to 1 cr of ELA



Other...Stuff

- **HB 4149 (Kuhn)** require dists send out an annual summary of specific pieces of data from MI School Data
- **HB 4152 (Schmaltz)** require math & science teacher prep program curriculum be developed w/ professor who specializes in the subject area

MICHIGAN HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Dear Speaker Wentworth,

Thank you for appointing us to lead the task force on school safety. We've had many productive meetings and discussions over the last three months. Our goal in this letter is to provide you with a report on our progress so far while we continue to collect and work on the many ideas that have been put forward.

Our work here isn't done yet. We are continuing to thoughtfully flesh out many of the recommendations and bill ideas in greater detail. However, we are at a point where we have reached a high-level consensus on several topics.

[Background, summary of meetings, and ongoing discussions:](#)

This taskforce is by no means starting from scratch when it comes to improving school safety in Michigan. It is important to recognize the tremendous amount of work that has already been done in this policy area, particularly over the past ten years. Good progress has been made in our state and throughout the country. With this in mind, the task force started its work by meeting with experienced groups and individuals who have already worked in this policy space.

We met as a group with many different people with different areas of expertise. Meetings have included conversations with and presentations from the Michigan State Police (MSP), MSP Office of School Safety, Okay2Say, Michigan Department of Education, Michigan Association of School Psychologists, Community Mental Health Association of Michigan, Oxford Public Schools, Safe Schools for Alex, SIGMA Threat Management, Michigan Sheriffs Association, Elementary and Middle School Principals Association, and groups representing school social workers and counselors. In addition to these meetings, individual members of our task force have received input from additional groups and professionals from their local communities and throughout the state. We also created a successful [web portal](#) where anyone in Michigan can share pertinent comments, recommendations, and information.

We have also thoroughly reviewed past recommendations, like those made by the [2018 School Safety Task Force](#) that was led by MSP. During this review, we found many previous recommendations have not yet been implemented. To remedy this, we've made fully implementing the best of those recommendations a top priority.

In addition to meetings with outside groups, the task force has met regularly amongst ourselves to have honest and frank discussions about the ideas presented to us. The goal of these discussions has been to hone in on ideas where the task force believes consensus support is achievable in the Legislature. This of course means there are some areas where the group does not agree. In the final report, we will include a list of topics that were discussed and whether a consensus was reached. For this progress report, we will simply include the items where we have a broad consensus amongst task force members.

HB 4141: Cell Phones

- **Graduated prohibition by grade band**
 - **K-5:** prohibited on school grounds
 - **6-8:** prohibit use on school grounds during
 - Instructional time
 - Breaks
 - Lunch
 - Recess
 - **9-12:** prohibit use on school grounds during instructional time
- **Local districts permitted to impose more stringent restrictions, but not less**
- **Wireless communications device: electronic device capable of texting, voice, entertainment, navigation, internet access, email.**

Possible Amendments:

- *Expand definition of prohibited devices to include photo and video capabilities.*
- *Explicitly allow:*
 - *Medical devices*
 - *District owned/designated devices*
- *Make 9-12 more restrictive*
- *Consider funding*

SB 234: Cell Phones

- **Require districts to adopt a policy on cell phone use in schools**
- **Must provide exceptions for medical device, emergency use**
- **Require policy to include "enforcement"**
- **Wireless communications device: electronic device capable of texting, voice, entertainment, navigation, internet access, email.**
- **No state support on enforcement, communication**
