School Social Worker Rule Revisions

- Revised School Social Worker Rules became effective June 27, 2024.
- Impact on Waivers and Approvals:
 - The School Social Worker (SSW) Waiver has been replaced by the SSW Permit.
 - The SSW Temporary Approval has been replaced by the Preliminary SSW Certificate.
 - The SSW Full Approval has been replaced by the Professional SSW Certificate.





School Social Worker Certificates

The role of a Michigan School Social Worker can be fulfilled by individuals who hold any of the following credentials:

- Preliminary School Social Worker Certificate (PSSWC)
- Professional School Social Worker Certificate (PSWC)
- Full School Social Worker Approval
- School Social Worker Permit (SSWP) (Applied for by district/ISD)

All applicants seeking a credential must apply on the Michigan Online Educator Certification System (MOECS) for a review to determine certificate eligibility





The School Social Worker Permit

- The permit application is completed in the Michigan Online Educator Certification System (MOECS) by the district.
- Requirements for the SSW Permit are the same as they were for the SSW Waiver: <u>School Social Worker</u> <u>Permit Requirements</u>.
- The permit is approved from the date the application is complete through the end of the academic year.
- The permit may be renewed once.





School Social Worker Certificates

- Applications for SSW Certificates are completed in MOECS by the candidate.
- SSW Certificate Requirements
 - Preliminary
 - Valid for 3 years
 - May be renewed once
 - Professional
 - Valid for 5 years
 - Renewed every 5 years

Administrator Certification



Special Education Director/Supervisor: Administrator Certificate Requirements

Pursuant to Michigan Compiled Law (MCL) 380.1246 and in accordance with the memoranda* issued by the Michigan Department of Education list below, an administrator of special education who is considered to be "administering instructional programs" must hold:

- a. a valid administrator certificate; AND
- an approval for director or supervisor of special education through the Office of Special Education.

An administrator of special education is considered to be "administering instructional programs" if she/he has responsibility for aspects listed below:

- curriculum;
- district or school improvement plan design or implementation;
- instructional policies;
- executive-level reporting on academic progress to governing authority; OR
- supervision and evaluation of direct reports responsible for instruction.

Please refer to the February 23, 2017 <u>Definition of "Administrating Instructional Programs"</u> <u>memo</u> for detailed information about each area.

Information about administrator certification requirements can be found within the <u>Standard School Administrator Certificate</u> guidance document. School districts must apply for a <u>School Administrator Permit</u> if the individual is not yet qualified for an administrator certificate.

Teachers assigned to a resource program may hold any special education endorsement. The only exceptions are for teachers whose only special education endorsement is the Physical Education for Students with Disabilities (SP) or the Early Childhood-General and Special Education (ZS) endorsement.

SUBJECT: Personnel Qualifications under Part B of the Individuals with Disabilities

Education Act (IDEA)

The U.S. Department of Education's (Department) Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) is committed to supporting States in the provision of a free appropriate public education (FAPE) to all children with disabilities. FAPE includes the provision of special education and related services that meet the requirements of IDEA Part B, which includes ensuring that special education teachers and related services providers are appropriately and adequately prepared and trained. This memo is intended to clarify States' obligations regarding the IDEA Part B requirements related to personnel qualifications, and alternate certifications. Based on media reports and discussions with States and advocates, OSEP is aware that some States currently have policies and procedures in place that may not be consistent with IDEA requirements. OSEP also recognizes that States are facing many challenges caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, including the impact it has had on exacerbating the shortage of special education teachers and related services providers across the country. Thus, OSEP believes it is critical to ensure that State educational agencies (SEAs) fully understand the IDEA requirements related to personnel qualifications and alternate certifications and alternate certifications and are aware of available resources to support their efforts to meet them.


Personnel Qualifications

Under Section 612(a)(14) of IDEA and 34 C.F.R. § 300.156, the SEA must establish and maintain qualifications to ensure that personnel necessary to carry out the purposes of IDEA Part B are appropriately and adequately prepared and trained, including that those personnel have the content knowledge and skills to serve children with disabilities. Those qualifications must ensure that each person employed as a public school special education teacher in the State who teaches in an elementary school, middle school, or secondary school; (1) has obtained full State certification as a special education teacher (including certification obtained through an alternate route to certification as a special educator, if such alternate route meets minimum requirements

Considerations

- For special education teacher placements, substitute candidates must meet personnel qualifications as required by the 34 CFR 300.156 of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).
- The IDEA is silent when it comes to substitutes but is clear with how a FAPE is provided.
- Minimum IDEA requirements requires that a teacher has a bachelor's degree and assumes functions only for a specified period of time not to exceed three years.

Memo #085-23 Substitute Teacher Placement for Special Education Programs

 The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) Office of Special Education (OSE) recommends intermediate school districts (ISDs) and local education agencies (LEAs), which include traditional public school districts and public school academies, review federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act minimum requirements for teachers placed in special education programs. MDE OSE suggests ISDs and LEAs prioritize substitute teacher placements in each special education program to ensure those programs are staffed by an individual who minimally has a bachelor's degree and is participating in either a traditional or alternative route to special education certification.





Temporary Placement Options

- A school is not required to obtain a Daily Substitute Permit for a Michigan certified teacher employed by the school, if the assignment does not exceed 90 calendar days. Per 390.1143 (2)(c)
- Daily Substitute Permit are for intermittent use and not to exceed 90 consecutive days for a special education assignment.
- Extensions are NOT permissible for a special education placement




Appropriate Placement in Special Education Settings

APPROPRIATE PLACEMENT

USING MICHIGAN'S RE-ENVISIONED STAFFING SYSTEM

In an effort to improve the quality of our educational system, Michigan has changed the way it prepares and certifies educators. Through deeper and more focused preparation, new teachers will be equipped to meet the unique learning needs of the whole child at each grade level.

At the same time, Michigan is experiencing a critical, wide-spread educator workforce shortage. The revised preparation and certification structure comprises only part of a comprehensive staffing system. With the addition of flexible and innovative options for placement and growth, Michigan can address both quality and quantity.



PK-12 APPROPRIATE PLACEMENT GUIDELINES

A certified teacher may always teach in the grade range and content area listed on their valid Michigan certificate. Endorsements on existing teaching certificates will not change. Teachers will retain those endorsements and schools will still be able to place them appropriately in the same manner as they have. Currently, due to the staffing shortage, teachers with these new endorsements may also teach outside the grade range and content area listed on their certificate, without a permit, as depicted in the chart below. MDE will periodically review and modify this flexible placement policy to address state workforce and student needs.

Every Michigan educator must hold a valid Michigan certificate or permit BEFORE their first day of employment.

Certificates are valid for 5 years. Permits are valid for only 1 year.

Elementary (ZG) and World Language (FA-FS) Staffing Flexibilities

This memo announces additional staffing flexibilities to intermediate school districts and local education agencies, both traditional public schools and public school academies.

Ensuring that an appropriately prepared and endorsed teacher is assigned to teach in Michigan's classrooms is critical to student achievement. The State Board of Education (SBE) has approved standards for preparing teachers in each endorsement area.

Michigan has offered a variety of elementary education endorsements, including Elementary K-5 All Subjects (K-8 All Subjects Self-Contained Classrooms) (ZG) and Elementary K-8 All Subjects (ZC). Districts should use this guidance when assigning teachers who hold one of these elementary endorsements.

A "self-contained classroom" is a classroom in which one teacher provides instruction to the same pupils for the majority of the instructional day. A majority of the instructional day is a number equaling more than 50% of the total instructional time in a day. This is typically found in elementary assignments where multiple subjects are taught by the same teacher.

Any other scenario in which a teacher provides instruction to the same group of students for less than 50% and/or where the teacher is the sole provider of instruction in a single subject area is considered "departmentalized." To be assigned to a departmentalized course, a teacher must hold the appropriate endorsement for the subject and grade level of the course. When staffing a departmentalized assignment, a district may refer to the Proper Placement Considerations guidance document.

Michigan districts provide 180 days of instruction, with a minimum of 1,098 instructional hours. The Pupil Accounting Manual (PAM) can be used to identify hours or minutes from the teacher's assignment that qualify as instructional time.


